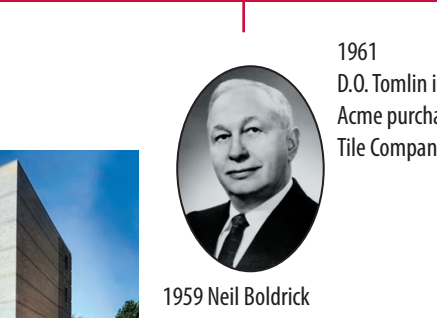
1935 Acme suffered its greatest loss of the depression with the death of Walter Bennett

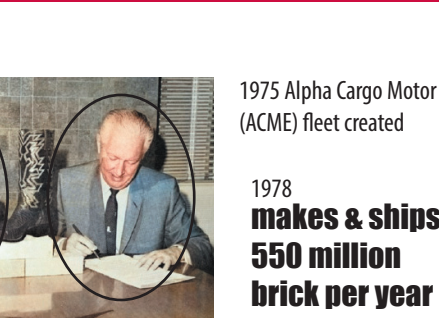

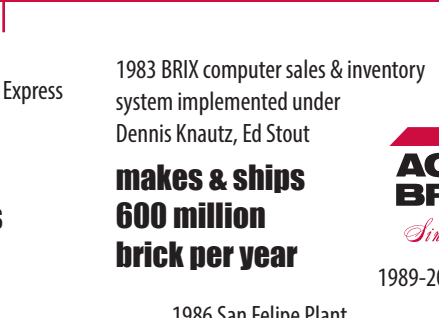
1969 D.O. Tomlin, left, and John Justin signed the merger agreement between Acme Brick Company & Justin Companies to become part of First Worth Corporation



1978 makes & ships 550 million brick per year



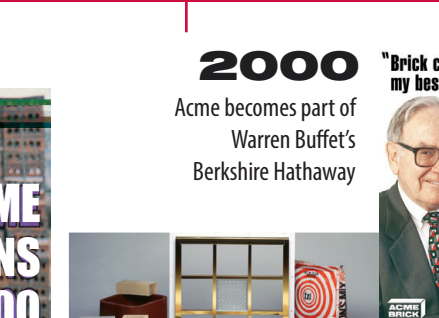
1987 Acme begins stamping name into residential brick
